TERM ONE RECAP






TIGERS: The Tiger's space has seen a wonderful first term to start our year together! This term we have focused on developing and facilitating meaningful, secure and reciprocal relationships and bonds between the Tiger children, their educators and peers to allow the Tigers to build a sense of belonging to the Tiger space. We have seen the Tigers settle into their room and begin to form friendships and bonds with their peers. The Tiger children have proved to be quite the sensory enthusiasts throughout this term, with many messy and sensory based experiences being the focus for learning within the Tiger's space. The Tigers have demonstrated dispositions for learning each day as they explored their world with confidence, enthusiasm and happiness. The Tiger children participated in celebrations for Lunar New Year, Water Week, Recycle Right and Sustainability Week and Easter! The Tiger children along with Ash, Kel, Amy and Abbey M have had a truly fantastic first term together. We are looking forward to all of the fantastic learning opportunities and experiences we will have to further promote development and growth for all within the Tigers community.



MONKEYS: In the Monkey Room this term, we focused on building strong, reciprocal and respectful relationships between both the children and the educators. We aimed to ensure that all of our activities were inclusive and supported our approach of using safe and gentle hands during play. We also ensured that the Monkey children felt safe and calm in their routine by implementing a routine that they would be familiar with and predict on any given day. This provides comfort and reassurance as the Monkey children are beginning to develop their confidence here at The Hub. We are so proud of the Monkey children and how they are interacting positively with others, using sharing techniques and beginning to use their vocabulary with key words that develop their sense of independence and create personal boundaries like "stop", "yes" and "no".



HIPPOS: Over our first term in the Hippo room together, we have built a wonderful sense of belonging through some amazing group projects such as our family tree. We loved getting to know about all of our families and look forward to learning more in the coming months. Our Hippo friends have enjoyed exploring colours. Each week we explored a different colour throughout a variety of experiences that allowed them to use the sense of sight, touch and smell as they developed their colour awareness, recognition and identification in many other activities. Recently our Hippo friends learnt about the different emotions we can feel, how to recognise our emotions and how we can help ourselves mange our big emotions and ask for help. We have done a lot of work on emotions and learning how to recognise them in others so that our friends can play happily alongside each other in all settings. In the coming weeks we are following our Hippo friends interests and listening to parent feedback. We have started working on developing our fine motor skills currently and have many more exciting experiences for the future. Thank you to all of our hippo families for all of your input over the first term, working collaboratively is the best way to ensure our friends learn to the best of their ability.







BEARS: Hi Bear families, What a fantastic start to the year we have had. We have been very busy with Lunar New Year, Water Week, Recycle Week, Harmony Day, Chickens hatching and Easter celebrations just to name a few. Sammi, Sis and Jacob have been building meaningful relationships with our Bears and ensuring they are comfortable and have a sense of belonging to the toddler area and Bear room. We have loved seeing our family tree grow with our Bears photos, we enjoy looking at our families and it is such a great conversation starter between peers. We thankyou for contributing to our favourite books with each book photocopied and placed on our display. It has provided us with so much joy to share our stories and has been great for our language development as we discuss our books together. Our Bears are forming friendships and discovering their independence and ability for self help skills. We enjoy showing our educators how capable and confident we are knowing they are right there to help at all times. We have busily explored colours and concepts, high/low, heavy/light, big/small and many more as well as putting these into practice during play. We are looking forward to many more discoveries and experiences with Sammi, Sis and Jacob.



CROCODILES: A beautiful start to the year in the Crocodiles room. Liz, Jordan and Ellie have worked together to ensure the children have felt as they belong within the room, forming strong connections with each child. Across the term we have had many celebrations broadening our world in which we live with the likes of Chinese Lunar New Year, Water Week, Recycle and Sustainability and most recently Easter. We also had the opportunity to see both the life cycles of a butterfly starting in out as caterpillars before going into a chrysalis then being a beautiful butterfly. After this we then had the Henny Penny hatchling program seeing the eggs become chickens and creating lots of excitement and also questions about life cycles. Our interests have been quite broad with sensory trays using play-dough, clay, shredded paper and rice along with adding colours, trucks and natural materials. We have been able to continue this each week with changing the sensory tray to the interest. Our newest interest has been learning to use scissors, using our hand eye coordination and scissor grip we have been working hard to learn to use them correctly with cutting paper, that we then collage with. Thanks for such a great term.



LIONS: The Lions have been learning to develop a strong sense of belonging by forming new friendships through many socio-dramatic plays. Home corners, construction sites, hairdressers and groceries, the children were invited to transfer their knowledge and share their ideas and thoughts while engaging in social moments. We have also been focusing on developing emotional regulations by reading picture books and exploring emotions in group discussions and through arts and crafts. This term, the Lions have been particularly interested in learning new songs, including some Korean songs! Some of our beloved songs are: "hello song" in Korean, "doughnut song", "I Know a Sound", "Mr Clickety Cane (wash your Face in orange juice)", "Walking in the Jungle", and "Hot Air ballooning'- cosmic kids yoga". We had many incursions this term; the butterfly enclosure and Henny Penny hatching provoked children's curiosity providing hands-on experiences for children to observe the difference and similarities between living and non-living things. The magic show has provided the lions to connect to the world around them through a fun, memorable event! The children have been reminiscing and sharing their memories with others by retelling what they had witnessed at the show.



ZEBRAS: During this term in the Zebra room we have all been fostering a sense of belonging to support the children in feeling safe and welcome in the learning environments, and supporting their development of critical social-emotional skills, supporting the development of friendships, and building resiliency. Educators support children in managing conflicts in many ways. Modelling how to be a friend is one of the most effective ways to support children and we have engaged in many social skill games to support the children. Acknowledging the similarities and differences in children to create a sense of belonging and acceptance of others has been a key focus.

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National Simultaneous Storytime

National Simultaneous Storytime (NSS) is held annually by the Australian Library and Information Association (ALIA). Every year a picture book, written and illustrated by an Australian author and illustrator, is read simultaneously in libraries, schools, pre-schools, childcare centres, family homes, bookshops and many other places around the country. Now in its 21st successful year, it is a colourful, vibrant, fun event that aims to promote the value of reading and literacy, using an Australian children's book that explores age-appropriate themes, and addresses key learning areas of the National Curriculum for Foundation to Year 6.

By facilitating NSS we aim to:

- promote the value of reading and literacy,
- promote the value and fun of books,
- promote an Australian writer and publisher,
- promote Storytime activities in public libraries and communities around the country,

Every room will be participating in reading the story and various activities.

Let's put our weight behind this awesome cause .

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
Hero Week

Showtime is a very exciting time in our day - it is our show and tell time. Everyone looks forward to Showtime starting. To make it fair on everyone we ask that your child only bring in things to show at their rostered time. This is a special time in our program where the children get to talk in front of their peers while they show or tell them something special. At the end of Showtime friends can ask questions. This activity encourages listening and talking, turn taking and question and answer. All of these are very important skills for children to develop in life. Please put your child's Showtime in the Showtime bag at the beginning of the day and let a staff member know what it is your child is showing for the day. Please collect your child's Showtime from the Showtime bag at the end of the day.

Routine

Upon Arrival

- Sign your child in.
- · Please apply sun cream.
- Wash your child's hands to remove any germs they have brought to preschool.
- Select a name tag with your child and choose any locker.
- Put their drink bottle on the drinks trolley and ensure child is wearing their hat
- Take your child to an activity.

When Leaving

- Sign your child out.
- Read the daily floor book which describes some of the days activities.
- Wash your child's hands.
- Empty your child's locker and return name tag to end of lockers.

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


Loose Parts

Loose parts play is a type of play that supports invention, divergent thinking, problem solving and offers a sense of wonder to children. They are materials that can be moved, carried, combined, redesigned, lined up, and taken apart and put back together in multiple ways. They are materials with no specific set of directions that can be used alone or combined with other materials.

This year we look forward to receiving your loose parts donations. Some examples of loose parts to bring in may include rocks, shells, feathers, materials,, wooden reels, PVC pipes, carpet squares, picture frames, old hair rollers, nuts and bolts, curtain rings.

Please hand items to Shelly at Reception so we can ensure we get risk assessments sorted for the items.



Here at The Hub Elermore Vale we have implemented a Mini Reverse Garbage (MRG). This MRG was born from The Hub's desire to be sustainable and encourage our children to do the same. The children in the preschool and toddler areas have access to the MRG to select materials to create their artworks. These materials may include (but are not limited to) small boxes, bottle tops, old wrapping paper, packaging materials and egg cartons.

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JUST A LITTLE Reminder

- Provide SPARE CLOTHES: Ensure you send at least two FULL change of clothes for your child everyday.
- Please label your child's drink bottle and leave it in their locker where they can access it.
- Please send a suitable SUNSAFE HAT for your child. Not a cap or cap with back flap. Please
 make sure the brim is at least 6cm all the way around. Hub hats and T-shirts are available to
 purchase.
- Safe shoes must be worn. Thongs are not suitable unless they have a back strap. Your child
 participates in climbing and other activities which require appropriate footwear. We do allow the
 children to remove their shoes for play.
- Please ensure your child has sunscreen on when they arrive each morning as it takes 20 minutes to be effective. Ours is available in if you have forgotten.
- Please dress your child in SUNSAFE clothing. Singlet tops and sleeveless dresses are NOT suitable.
- Please remember BEFORE 8am drop all your child's belongings to the room then take your child
 to the TIGERS room. Please do not leave your child alone in a room without an Educator. AFTER
 4:30pm collect all your child's belongings from their room and then collect your child from the
 TIGERS (babies) and MONKEYS (Toddlers and Preschoolers) rooms.
- Please remember to SUPPLY enough pull-ups for the day for your child.
- Please remember to bring any medication required and hand them to an educator, and fill in a medication form on OWNA for its' administration.
- Please remember over the counter medications must be appropriate for the age of your child eg: Dimetapp.
- Please remember your child's ART is their day's work. Please try and take their artwork home and refrain from throwing it in the bin at the service. They have great pride in what they make during the day.
